My dear Dr. Patrick:

Your letter of October 25th is at hand. Personally, I should be delighted to hear Dr. Riza Tewfik, but I do not know how much room there may be left on our lecture program, nor what funds may still be available. That matter is in the hands of a committee. I will, however, take up the question with the Chairman at the earliest opportunity.

Dr. Riza Tewfik is the father of Selma Riza, is he not? If so, I should be doubly interested to meet and hear him, both on account of his intimate personal knowledge of Turkey during the War and the Revolution, and on account of Selma, for whom both Mrs. Collier and myself conceived a sincere respect and a genuine liking. She bore herself with remarkable fortitude and discretion under most trying and difficult circumstances.

It was a great disappointment to Mrs. Collier and myself not to be able to see you in Williamstown this summer; but one thing and another occurred to prevent. First of all, we were detained here until the middle of July, on account of Sheldon's competition for a place in the Olympic team. That was not settled until the final tryouts in Cambridge on July 7th. To our great joy he made the team and sailed on the President Roosevelt on the 11th. He ran in Amsterdam, and qualified in the trials and semi-finals, and the finals, making third place, not so bad for a lad of twenty. Many of the competitors were four or five years older than he, and some of them had competed in previous Olympics. He also ran later in England, on the American shuttle hurdle team, which beat a picked team representing the British Empire. All in all, it was a fine experience for him. He is now back in the University, in his Senior year, and up to his ears with college work and student activities of all sorts, having been elected President of his class, and also President of the Senior Honor Society, beside being Captain of the Track Team. He now has his eye on a Rhodes Scholarship, and has put in an application. What will come of it no one knows, but it is at least worth trying for.

Harriott returned to Tampa early in September, and is busy at work and characteristically happy. She throws herself with enthusiasm and energy into anything she undertakes, adjusts herself readily to a new environment, accepts life without hesitation or reservation and gets an immense satisfaction out of whatever she does. She is almost madly in love with Tampa and Florida, and declares that she never wants to live in the north again, particularly in the winter. While I love New England, and can hardly think of myself at home anywhere else, I confess to a secret sympathy with her aversion to a northern winter, with its concomitant of furnaces and sidewalks. That part, at least, I could gladly forego. Harriott has begun to talk about having Mrs. Collier go down to Tampa for a month or six weeks, in February and

March, and I too am urging it. It would do Mrs. Collier a world of good, for she really does suffer from the cold; neuritis is a mean thing anywhere, but almost unbearable in our damp cold northern climate.

What are your plans for the winter? Shall you stay in New York or shall you be going south later on? I do hope that we may have an opportunity to see you before many months slip by. I suppose that you hardly want to move about very much during the winter, but when it comes spring, you must, if you are anywhere near, make us another visit.

With love from us both, and hoping that it may not be too long before we have at least a glimpse of you, I am, as always

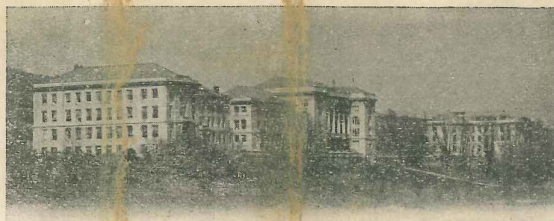

Dr. Riza Tewfik was for some years during the period of the great war, Professor of Turkish, Arabic and Persian, in Constantinople Woman's College. He saved us from many embarrassing positions in connection with the Government, at one time succeeding in postponing the levellellig upon the College of a tax of many thousand dollars.

Dr. Riza was at the same time Professor of Philosophy in the Turkish University in Stamboul, and he was the first there to receive women in his classes. He is at present a member of the government of Transjordan, and Curator of an Archeological Museum in Amman, as archeology is included in the subjects in which he is an authority.

Under Sultan Mehmed VI, Dr. Riza Tewfik held the position of Minister of Education, and Minister and President of the Council of State. He has been prominent in promoting education in all lines.

Dr. Riza Tewfik is a specialist in the knowledge of Arabic, Persian and Turkish. He also speaks French, English, Greek and Spanish, and has an understanding of kindred languages.

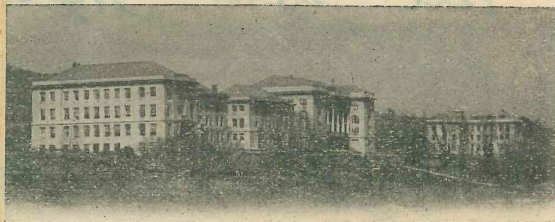

Dear Mr. Ravndal,

Dr. Riza Tewfik has the promise of an English passport from the English Consulate, and he desires an American visa, as he has been invited to go to America to lecture by Dr. Stephen Duggan of the Carnegie Peace Foundation.

About two years ago Dr. Riza Tewfik was in England and desired at that time to go to America. The government at Washington at first refused permission, but afterwards sent a cable to Dr. Riza, promising him a visa to the United States. This cable Dr. Riza still has. It is true that the broken relations between Turkey and the United States still exist, yet the relation between England and Turkey are in a much worse condition, as England and Turkey are technically still at war. Therefore if he can get an English passport, surely he can get an American visa, especially when he has a cable from Washington giving him permission to go to America.

I hope there will be no trouble about this, as you well know how grateful this College is to Dr. Riza Tewfik and how much he did during the war to protect us, and what stand he has taken during these years for American education. Furthermore, the English are making a special exception in giving passports to Dr. Riza, Ali Kemal and others who have withstood some phases of the aggressive policy that has been so difficult.

Will you kindly let me know immediately if there will be any difficulty about this matter, and if so what steps I should take.
