CURFEW IN 100 TOWNS, 30 UNDER ARMY CONTROL

SIKHS SHIFTED TO CAMPS

NEW DELHI, Nov. 4: With hundred towns and cities under curfew and nearly 30 of them handed over to army control for restoring law and order, several thousand Sikhs have been shifted to relief camps in various parts of India to protect them from the Hindu frenzy still on the rampage despite the emergency measures by the law enforcing agencies throughout the length and breath of India mourning in anger the death of Mrs. Indira Gandhi at the hands of Sikh assassins.

Security has been further tightened in Delhi where curfew was reimposed in most parts of the city soon after dusk yesterday.

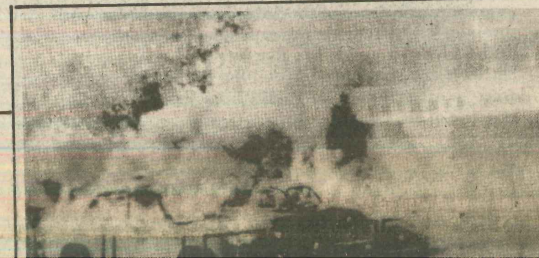

Shultz protests to Moscow

NEW DELHI, Nov 4: As US Secretary of State George Shultz made a strong protest with the Soviet Prime Minister here about Soviet propaganda implicating United States and CIA in Mrs. Gandhi's murder. However, Radio Moscow quoting Pravda relayed another story yesterday in which top Indian politicians were quoted saying that external forces had a hand in Indira Gandhi's assassination.

The Radio Moscow further charged that foreign intervention has grossly increased in the internal affairs of India.

Meanwhile informed sources said that US Secretary of State told Soviet Prime Minister yesterday that the baseless allegations which are being dished out by the Soviet media about US involvement in the Indian Prime Minister's murder can put lives

of Hundreds of Americans in India in danger.

REAGAN SNUBS USSR

WINTERSSET, Iowa, Nov. 4, (APP/Reuter): President Reagan said yesterday that Soviet suggestions of U.S. complicity in the assassination of Indian Prime Minister Indira Gandhi were a cheap way of making political capital from a human tragedy.

Official Soviet reports last week linked Gandhi's assassination to the United States and Moscow radio suggested the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) was involved.

Asked to comment during an election campaign visit, Reagan said: "to take advantage of a tragedy of this kind, to try and gain some kind of political advantage—it was a cheap shot".

The BBC correspondent in Delhi said this morning that streets here had a deserted look life was far from normal. He said that military pickets have been increased and Premier Rajiv Gandhi who twice visited the troubled areas yesterday had ordered to intensify patrolling in the strife torn areas.

Meanwhile doctors in Delhi hospitals were busy day and night giving treatment to the seriously injured Sikhs who are being brought in hundreds to these hospitals. Special arrangements have been made for cremation of dozens of Sikhs who lost their lives in the worst-ever riots in the Indian capital.

According to Reuter people were slowly returning to New Delhi's streets, autorickshaws furiously searched for customers.

Rajiv has replaced the capital's Lieutenant Governor and ordered beefed-up security forces into the capital within hours of lighting the funeral pyre of his assassinated mother Indira Gandhi yesterday.

New Delhi's Additional Police Commissioner Gutam Kaul told Reuters 20,000 Sikhs were in government relief camps under tight police protection. "They fled their homes and will remain in the camps until they feel it is safe to return", Kaul said.

Police reports from other parts of India hit by the violence also indicated the nation was slowly limping back to normal.

DEATH TOLL

The toll in the central state of Madhya Pradesh had reached 76, with more deaths reported in the states of Uttar Pradesh, Bihar and Haryana as well as in New Delhi.

PTI said that in Kanpur, a major industrial city in Uttar Pradesh 10,000 Sikhs had been evacuated to six camps. It said special police squads there had recovered looted property worth more than five million rupees which would be returned to the original owners.

It quoted officials in the Madhya Pradesh state capital Bhopal as saying 38 places in the state were under curfew. In Raipur, one boy was killed and three police men injured in clashes after a group set fire to effigies of Gandhi's assassins.

Commandos who killed assassins arrested

DUBAI, Nov 4: Two commando trained security men who killed one of the assassins of Mrs Gandhi have been taken into custody. Their arrest has been made on the suspicion of their alleged involvement in the conspiracy of Mrs Gandhi's assassination.

According to intelligence sources these commandoes could have arrested alive both the assassins Beant Singh and Satwant Singh, but their attempt to kill both of them seems to be a cover-up attempt. The outcome of their interrogation was not available as relevant authorities are tight-lipped in this respect.

The day Indira said 'no' to continuing war with Pakistan

DAILY NEWS REPORT

KARACHI, Nov 4: Late Indian Premier Mrs. Indira Gandhi was opposed by the members of her cabinet and army generals at the time she had arbitrarily offered cease fire on behalf of India during the 1971 war.

According to an interview published in "Guardian" of London this disclosure was made by Mrs Gandhi to Pakistan-born British journalist Mr Tariq Ali during a conversation. The interview which was taken in the beginning of this year has been published by newspaper now.

Referring the fall of Dhaka in the interview Mrs Gandhi had said that while she was giving interview to a Swedish

television team she received a telephone call from the Indian army chief in which she was told of India's victory. She thanked the General for informing her and asked him to meet her the next day.

Mrs Gandhi told Tariq Ali that after her interview with the Swedish television team was over she immediately summoned the meeting of her cabinet. At that time her cabinet consisted of those politicians most of whom were in the opposition at the time of Indira's death. They now blame her that her attitude with Pakistan was very strict, but at that time all of them had entered her room shouting the slogan in chorus "We have won", "We have won", and they were insisting that the war with Pakistan should continue till final victory. Mrs Gandhi said that they were saying that the enemy should be destroyed for ever.

Mrs Gandhi told Tariq Ali that when she sat down to preside over the cabinet meeting she was all alone in offering a cease-fire arbitrarily to Pakistan. However by the end of the time of meeting she had succeeded in getting cabinet's approval. She said that whenever she felt she was right in her decision she stood firmly by it. After that the cabinet passed a resolution in which it was appealed that a cease-fire should be implemented.

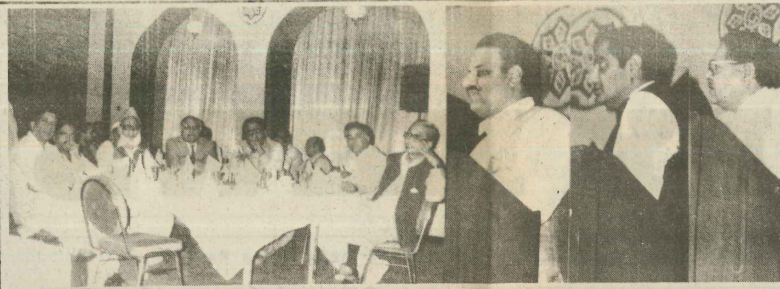
Aftermath of Indira's death

In the aftermath of Mrs Indira Gandhi's assassination on Wednesday last, India has been engulfed in a worst communal frenzy it had ever experienced before. Mrs. Gandhi's assassins being Sikhs and, they having committed the crime as a reaction to Mrs. Gandhi's military action on the Golden Temple in June last, their community is being made to pay the price of the dastardly act. According to unconfirmed reports and conservative figures more than two thousand Sikhs have been done to death with immense loss to their property. Nearly hundred cities and towns have been put under curfew while 30 have been handed over to the army to restore law and order. Many areas were still in flames till last reports came in. Several hundred Sikhs to escape the backlash in India, have entered Nepal and other adjoining areas. The lawlessness has been so widely spread that at places there was hardly any security people available to stop the rioters on the rampage.

The new Prime Minister Mr Rajiv Gandhi despite the fact that he is braving a personal loss in the death of his illustrious mother Mrs. Indira Gandhi, has been making fervent appeals to the people of India and in particular the Hindu majority, to give up their vengeance because the path to revenge could lead to disastrous consequences for India. Mr. Rajiv Gandhi warned the people that they should not play into the hands of the enemies of the country who are out there to make capital out of the great tragedy.

There are no two views that the blood-bath that is being resorted to against the Sikh community in India, is most dangerous for the unity of the country. Sanity must return to the people before the wound becomes too deep and incurable. The entire Sikh community cannot be punished for the dastardly act of a few extremists. This fact was even reflected in Mrs Gandhi's decision to keep her Sikh guards despite threats to her life by the Sikh extremists.

While the Indian government must do all that is possible and within its means to get deep down to know the conspirators and the possibilities of CIA's hand in the plot to kill Mrs Gandhi, it should also in the first place crush lawlessness against the Sikh community and secondly, it should take the initiative to solve the Sikh problem in order to restore the confidence of the Sikh community in the main stream of national life. In this connection it must pay heed to the advice of people like Khushwant Singh and should not leave any stone unturned to balm the Sikh wounds in order to strengthen India as had been the aim and life objective of Mrs Gandhi.

Issues on which Reagan & Mondale disagree

WASHINGTON, Nov 4 (APP/Reuter): President Reagan and his Democratic challenger Walter Mondale disagree on a wide range of issues in what both describe as a stark and classic choice between conservative and liberal.

The major dispute, however, boil down to a handful that have drawn widespread notice and might sway undecided voters:

Here is a summary of the central issues:

Taxation and budget deficits: Reagan opposes increased taxation in principle and would raise only as a last resort, a situation he does not now foresee. He insists US Government budget deficits of about 180 billion dollars annually will decrease as continued economic boom brings in higher revenues at present tax rates.

Mondale says any president will have to raise taxes next year to start cutting deficit, and insists Reagan has a secret plan to do so that will hit the middle class while sparing the rich.

Arms control: Reagan held his first official talks with Soviet foreign minister Andrei Gromyko in the midst of the campaign and says he hopes this will lead to regular, cabinet level contacts between Moscow and Washington, and a resumption of frozen US-Soviet talks on nuclear arms control. He still blames Moscow for throttling those talks but has taken a more conciliatory line of late.

Mondale notes that Reagan is the first US President since World War II never to have met his Soviet counterpart. He says Reagan is not serious about controlling nuclear arms and is ignorant of basic facts of the arms race. Mondale would seek an immediate summit with Kremlin leaders to support a mutual balance.

Masjid-i-Nabawi expansion and renovation

JEDDAH, Nov. 4 (APP/Reuter): King Fahd of Saudi Arabia has laid the foundation stone for a project to expand the Prophet's mosque in Medina, the second holiest shrine of the world's estimated one billion Muslims.

King Fahd unveiled the mosque's plaque with a call for all Muslims to "adhere to the faith and face all challenges."

The mosque, which now accommodates about 30,000 worshippers, will hold 110,000 after the expansion, which will also include building six more minarets bringing the total to 10.

TO CURB RIOTS

Indian opposition parties demand army into action

NEW DELHI, Nov. 4 (APP/IRNA): The opposition political parties in India in a statement urged the government to put the army in to action to prevent the sectarian clashes and disturbances that have broken out in various cities after assassination of the late Prime Minister Indira Gandhi.

The statement said that innocent women and children have fallen victims to these brutal sectarian clashes and people's properties have been destroyed. It said that the situation was similar to that at the time of the struggle for India's independence.

World rice output to go up this year

KARACHI, Nov. 4 (APP/Reuter): World rice production this year will be an estimated 456 million tonnes, six million tonnes more than last year, according to the latest FAO monthly bulletin.

Some 430.9 million tonnes would come from developing countries and the rest from developed countries.

The expected increase is likely to be concentrated in Asia and north and South America, with the output of most other regions unchanged or slightly up in 1983.

World rice trade in 1984 would be 12 million tonnes, 4 per cent up on last year, the report said.

Most of the increase in demand is expected to come from Asia.

Suazo Cordova is waiting in prison for extradition hearings to begin.

A police spokesman said General Jose Bueso Rosa was transferred to Santiago's public jail after turning himself over to Chilean detectives yesterday when Paraguay refused his request for political asylum.

He said Honduras and the United States both wanting to extradite Bueso to face charges in connection with the coup plot, now have days to present documents backing their request to the supreme court.

Lebanon closes

all illegal ports in country

BEIRUT, Nov 4 (APP/Reuter): Lebanon's government yesterday asserted its authority by closing illegal ports which have been draining its coffers but faced problems over negotiations for an Israeli withdrawal from the south of the country.

Prime Minister Rashid Carani told reporters he hoped his cabinet could meet in time to appoint a negotiating team and avoid any delay in UN sponsored talks with Israel due to start on Monday.

But citing travel difficulties or four of his nine-man

abinet now out of the country, he said he could not rule out the possibility the talks might have to be postponed.

Lebanon has to convince Israel that if it withdraws 2,000 occupation troops, the Lebanese army is capable of securing Israel's northern border from Guerrilla attacks.

Meanwhile, five Lebanese army patrol boats and a Hawker Hunter warplane started patrolling at dawn to stop ships looking at illegal militia-run ports along a 110 km (70 miles) stretch of coastline, from the Israeli front lines in the south to the Syrian controlled port of Tripoli in the north.

Krishnan beaten by unseeded Masur

TAIPEI, Nov. 4 (APP/Reuter): Unseeded Australian Wally Masur beat second seed Ramesh Krishnan of India in straight sets to reach the final of the 75,000 dollar Taipei Open Tennis Championships.

Masur's greater power helped him to a 6-4, 6-4 win after he conceded early breaks of service in both sets.

In the other singles semifinals, top seeded American Brad Gilbert recovered from an uneasy start to beat compatriot Larry Stefanki 6-4, 6-2.

USSR may ask Svetlana to denounce West

MOSCOW, Nov. 4 (APP/Reuter): Svetlana Stalin's return to Moscow 17 years after defecting to the United States has prompted speculation among diplomats that she may be forced to publicly denounce the West.

Her return announced yesterday by a brief Kremlin statement saying Soviet citizenship had been restored to her, has caused a sensation and western diplomats said it would have delighted the Soviet leadership.

Since a television news bulletin on Friday there has been no further word on Svetlana, daughter of dictator Josef Stalin whose name is synonymous with repression and mass murders in the Soviet Union in the 1930s.

Irish soccer star held for drunken driving

LONDON, Nov. 4 (APP/Reuter): A London magistrate yesterday issued a warrant for the arrest of former Northern Ireland soccer international George Best after he failed to appear in court to answer a drunken driving charge.

Best 38, who played soccer in both Britain and the United States, was arrested on the Mall leading to Buckingham palace.

Police released him on bail after charging him with driving with excess alcohol in his blood, magistrate William Robinson issued a warrant for his arrest after he failed to appear in court when his case was called.

Over 2.5 lac Poles mourn priest's death

WARSAW, Nov. 4 (APP/Reuter): At least 250,000 Poles mourned murdered militant anti-communist priest father Jerzy Popieluszko in one of the biggest public gatherings in Poland since World War two.

Roman Catholics and supporters of the outlawed trade union solidarity flocked from all corners of the country to Warsaw yesterday for Popieluszko's burial and a requiem mass led by Poland's primate, cardinal Jozef Glemp.

Some 10,000 people marched through the capital after the funeral chanting solidarity slogans and waving banners but hundreds of police backed by water cannon dispersed them without force by mounting a roadblock.

POLLS IN NICARAGUA TODAY

MANAGUA, Nov. 4 (APP/Reuter): Nicaraguans vote today in a poll which the left wing Sandinist leadership hopes will give it greater international legitimacy but which the opposition has termed a farce.

Seven parties, including the ruling Sandinist National Liberation Front (FSLN) have put up candidates in the elections for a President, Vice-President and a 90-member constituent assembly.

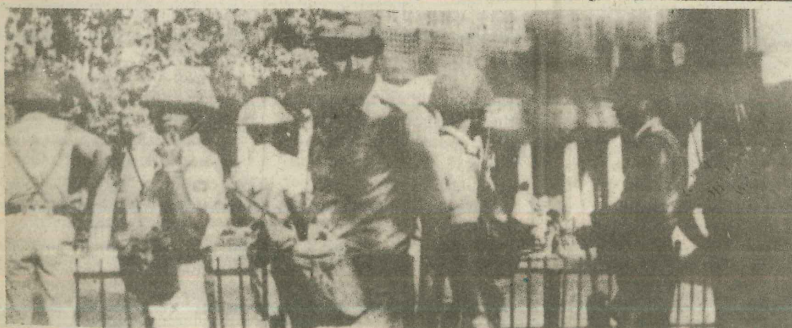

Vital importance of cotton to national economy emphasised

KARACHI, Nov. 4: The vital importance of cotton to the economy of Pakistan can hardly be over-emphasised. Not only does it sustain the largest and widely dispersed industry, employing a substantial industrial labour force, but it is a major foreign exchange earner of the country.

This was stated by Federal Minister for Food, Agriculture and Co-operatives, Vice Admiral Mohammad Fazil Janjua in his inaugural address at FAO Workshop-cum Training Course on cotton organised by FAO in collaboration with Pakistan Central Cotton Committee (PCCC) here.

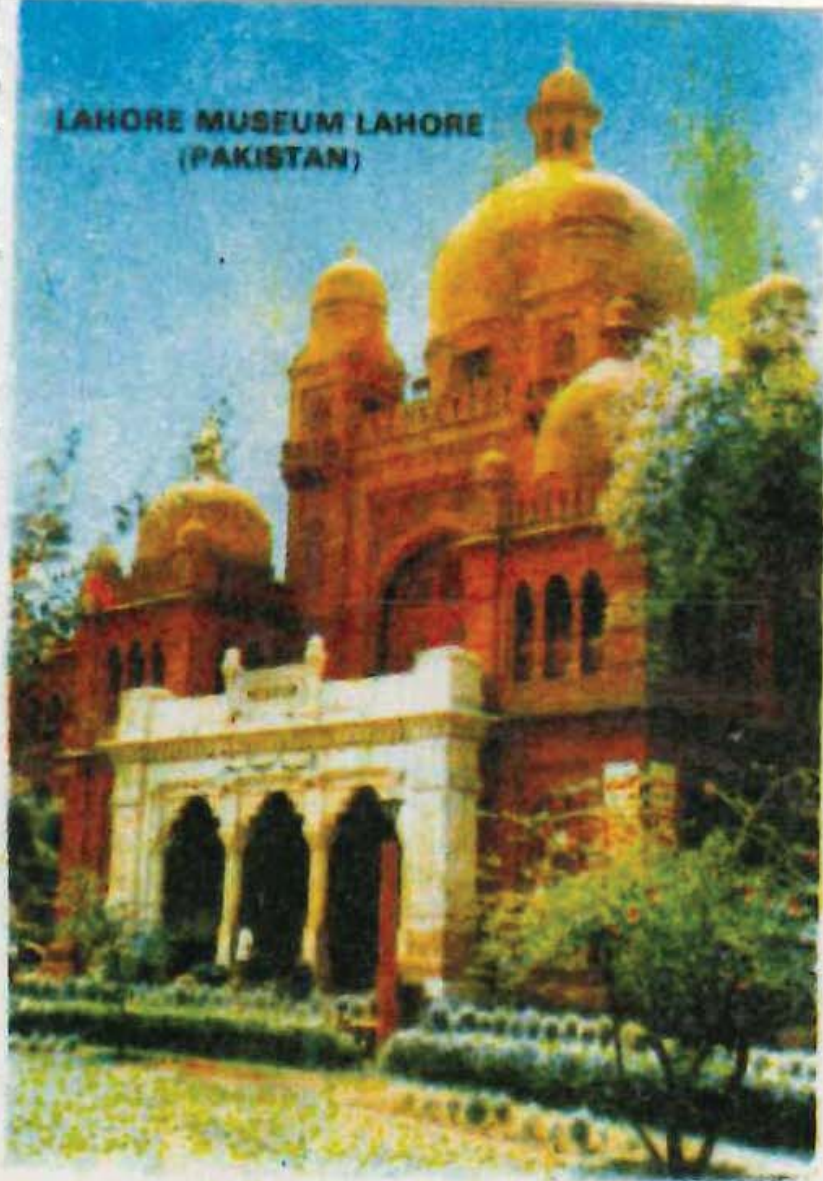
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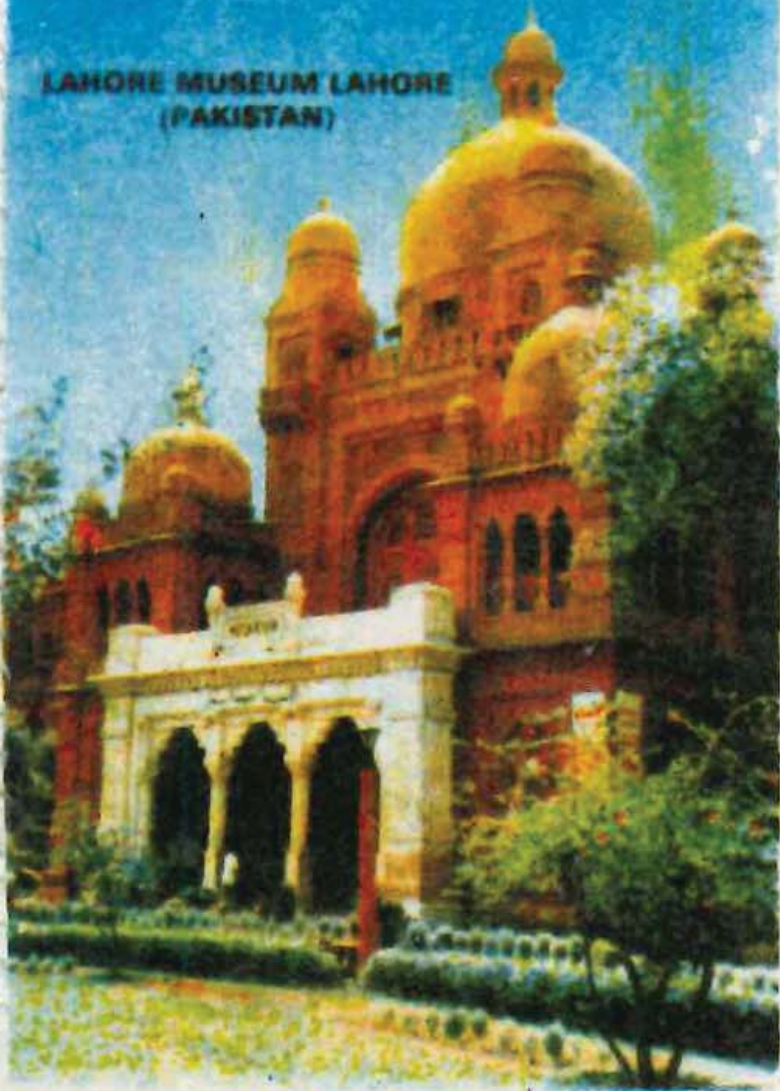
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
