Special Service to the Manila Times Durazzo, Albania, June 5.—Turbulence in Albania continues, and the insurgent demand for the removal from the throne of Prince William of Wied, and the naming in his place of a Mohammedan princentinues.

The International Commission of Control have returned to this place after a fruitless attempt to negotiate with the insurgents. No arguments, the commission stated, could move them from their demand for a Mohammedan ruler.

Shortly after the return of the commission, martial law was proclaimed. Then the Malissories were ordered to take the field against the insurgents, but some of them refused to fight, and it was finally decided to cancel the order.

## DON'TS FOR TURKISH PRINCES

Imperial Edict Forbids Them to Frequent Dancing Places.

That the deportment of the princes of the Imperial family of Turkey has not been all it should have been in the past is the conclusion forced on one by the publication of a special law relating to them passed by the Council of the Imperial Court, apparently by desire of the Sultan. This enactment, which is said to be causing much heartburning among the younger members of the imperial family, runs:

The Imperial princes may not take hackney carriages to go into any district of the town or its suburbs, nor may they take caiques (small sailing vessels) autobuses or electric cars. When they wish to travel by train or vessel, a special car or small cabin shall be placed

at their disposal.

They are formally forbidden to frequent hotels, casinos, cafes chantant, restaurants and beer houses, or to mix with the crowds. They must not go to theaters, balls or motion pictures, and if invited to be present at the aforesaid spectacles by benevolent societies, or if asked to take them under their high patronage, they must not accept save only by the authorization of the Sultan. They must not have dealings with suspected persons or those not having a suitable position.

The aforesaid decisions, taken by the Council of the Court, have been sanctioned for application in full by Imperial irade.
