Sis Selma is here and she says that you are very fascinating and have all what a young fellow would like to have and I can see it for myself from the small pictures father sent me.

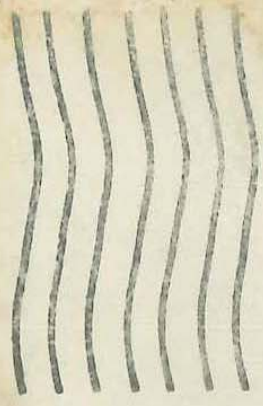

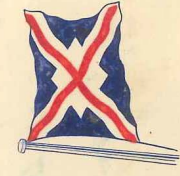

Your verse fits in with my mood today as I sit alone, my comrades always take advantage of the weekend to visit Adelaide, personally I prefer the solitude here for two days, to going citywards & staying at a club where the main topics of conversation are the horse racing & drinking, but nevertheless I do have moments of loneliness & invariably

One day it may be possible for me to revisit the Lebanon & visit Turkey to renew friendship with yourself & Sabih, & we are taught that if wants are wished for hard enough, they eventually materialise, so I am living in hopes that one day, my dearest wish will really come true.

What is your opinion Doctor, of all this unrest & suspicion, which seems to have taken hold of almost every country? During the war years it was apparently possible for the countries concerned, to work in harmony & trusting friendship with their allies, but now that Peace!! is here, we see nothing but quarrels & accusations one to the other, until it seems there must already be another war brewing, (heaven forbid) where is this "brotherhood of man" we fought to achieve? Have we already lost sight of the things we were supposed to be fighting for, "peace on earth and goodwill to

all men, even in each country there seems to be mutual dislike & hostility between the different classes. In Australia here one strike seems to succeed another with unfailing regularity, sometimes apparently over the most trivial & often ridiculous incidents. America is in the same throes, it seems to me that there is some cause to blame for it, perhaps it happens as a sort of reaction to the strain & worries of the war years, but it certainly prevents one from feeling that peace is even approaching. Let me know your diagnosis of this disease.

Palestine seems destined for more trouble & my sympathies are all with the rightful residents the Arabi. I have some friends in the Police there & I know that they also have sympathy for the same people, (were they allowed to have any) that the other side seem to be well aware of this is borne out by the number of police murdered by this ungrateful sect. Is there anywhere in this world, where one could really say "Peace reigneth here", I doubt if there is any such place.

Well Doctor I will conclude now with the remark that your photo, is just as I remember you.

Your remarks endorsing and emphasizing upon my parallelism between the Christian Reformation and the present movements in Islam are most interesting. May we not hope for increasing understanding and sympathy between the liberal, humanitarian elements of both our worlds?

That, certainly, was one of the chief reasons for my writing "The New World of Islam" — to present to Western readers (to the best of my ability) the mighty changes going on in the East. For, as I say at the close of my book:

"To know is to understand" — and to hope: to hope that this present travail, vast and ill-understood, may be but the birth-pangs of a truly unascend East taking its place in a unascend world."

try dedicate themselves to this cause—unless they are willing to sacrifice now for peace as much as they will have to sacrifice for war later.

If this country is to be kept out of war, money is greatly needed. A million dollars in 1936 is little enough. A million dollars is the amount the United States spends every eight hours of every day preparing for war. The lag end of one's day and the money that is left over after other appeals have been answered is not enough. Only sacrificial service now can prevent the sacrifice of men and millions later.

There are some who can contribute \$50,000 and not really suffer. There are some who can give \$25,000 and some who can give \$10,000 and some \$5000. Then there are those who can give \$1000, \$500, \$250, \$100, \$50, \$25, etc. Some can give \$1.00 a day, 50c a day, 25c a day, 10c a day, a postage stamp a day. Everyone should have some part in keeping this country from going to war.

The national funds of the Campaign are administered by the American Friends Service Committee and the books are regularly audited by a Certified Public Accountant.

Remember that the great drive for peace depends upon what you do. Don't do your bit—DO YOUR BEST.

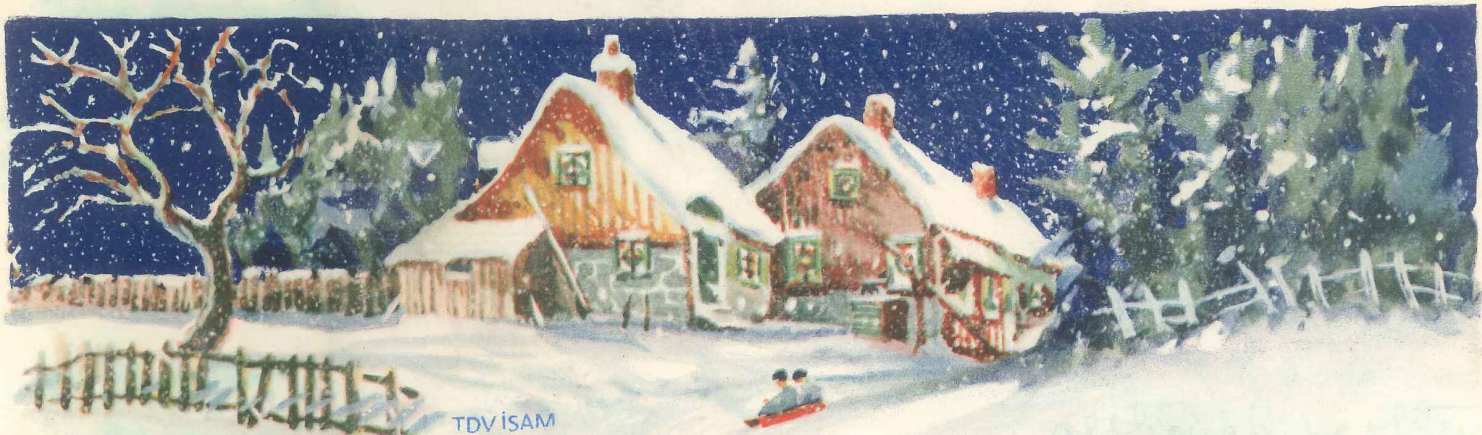

I thought I would just drop you a line to let you know that we are comfortably installed in our new home. It is delightful here and I get out into the fresh air a great amount. Unfortunately just after I arrived I had rather a bad attack of malaria but it must have been lying dormant in my system as I could not possibly have contracted it here as time would not have allowed it. All my work this winter and spring is in the Jordan Valley working southwards from 'Jis Mejanie' and the climate is delightful. In the summer I go on leave and return to next winter to spring to continue.

When you see His Highness will you tell him I continually think of him, his graciousness and kindness. I often talk of him. There is just one thing I wish you would tell His Highness and that is

during my stay in Trans-Jordan I considered
my services were personal to His Highness and I
always felt from the first to the last that
on no occasion so far as I could see was there
ever any misunderstanding between us. I
have very pleasant memories of happy moments
with the Emir as a man and as a ruler
and these memories are extended to include his
very fine boy Tilal - and we shall see what
we shall see later. There are links which
bind me to the reigning house of Trans-Jordan.
They are forged too strongly and too firmly for
me to change my opinions as to the future
and whatever success is attained by the House
of Abdullah there will always be at least one
