
My dear Mr. Tewfik:

Dear Mr Edmonds,

Your very gentle letter came to me as the greatest reward which I ever had the chance of winning in this hospitable and very polite country. I am ~~very~~<sup>so</sup> proud of it and I will keep it as a (diplôme d'honneur) for ever.

My being your guest for some days in the International house as a member of your happy family gave me - besides the unexpressible pleasure I felt for the first time of my <sup>social</sup> life - the most favourable occasion to see, to study and to realize the highest moral and social qualities which made of the americans the best citizens and the kindest people of the world. So my stay amongst you completed my social education, and increased my knowledge by giving me the chance of observing the best example of humanity ~~and~~ fellowship, and civic virtues.

As to my lectures, I am so happy to learn from an authority like you that they have ~~been~~ not failed in attracting <sup>attention</sup> and ~~sympathy~~ <sup>sympathy</sup> ~~tendered~~ a little service, ~~at least~~ - if not in

practical knowledge - but at least in discovering among your sympathetic children those who had a natural disposition, a temperamental tendency for general and speculative philosophy.

The International Student Assembly Committee submits the following topics for discussion at future meetings of the Assembly this year. There will be four more meetings, on the following dates:

January 13, February 10, March 10, April 14.

All Members of the House are invited to signify by marking an X, their four preferences among the nine subjects listed below. Any additional subject desired may be written down, in the form of a debatable question, on this sheet, for consideration by the Committee.

When you leave the Assembly Hall, please leave this sheet on tables at the doors after the supper.

1. That nationalism is the greatest obstacle to harmonious international relations.
2. That the culture and institutions of the minorities should be preserved, rather than absorbed into those of the majority.
3. That democracy is the best form of government for all peoples.
4. That the intermingling of races by marriage should be discouraged.
5. That the advantages of the adoption of an international language would outweigh the disadvantages.
6. That the time has now come when we should change the capitalistic for some other order of society.
7. That the lecturing system of the universities is out of date, and should give place to a better.
8. That the Kellogg Pact and the Monroe Doctrine are not inconsistent.
9. That the adhesion of the United States to the League of Nations and the World Court is desirable in the interests of world peace.
